QUILT IN ITALY

The Chapter had the distinguished opportunity to bring Quilt to Italy in conjunction with the annual International Book Fair in Torino, Italy. As the Chapter is well connected with many of the NAMES Project International Affiliates, we were asked by DIRE AIDS, the local HIV/AIDS organization, to help bring Quilt from different countries, and bring our respective HIV/AIDS prevention/education, and peer education programs to share. As Hepatitis C is a much bigger problem in Italy than HIV/AIDS, and "Hep C" is in the same high-risk family as HIV/AIDS, the agency believes that by using the visual power of the Quilt they can affectively reach this at-risk community.

Over 80 sections of Quilt from the USA, Philippines, South Africa, Guatemala, and Italy were on display. The Quilt was unfolded using the traditional unfolding ceremony by over 60 young students. The event was sponsored in part by the launching of AmFar's new book entitled "Guest's and Foreigners: Corporal Histories" by Joseph Kosuth.

One suggestion we offered for the future to our colleagues is to match students from New York City who have been involved with HIV peer education programs, find the funding to create a student exchange program, and bring students together from both countries and share each other's experiences. We look forward to helping our Italian colleagues.

The collaborations we do in any country that has cultural ties with our own communities we will continue to explore in our effort to better serve New Yorkers. Anyone with funding and/or experience with developing exchange programs we encourage to contact the Chapter.

World AIDS DAY 2001

This will be our seventh year of commemorating World AIDS Day in all the five boroughs of New York City, December 1, 2001 (WAD2001). Last year we had over 100 different locations, and the requests for participation have already begun. Invitations will go out to organizations, medical centers, places of worship, corporate offices, and financial institutions.

We traditionally have over a dozen schools who use the National School Quilt Program from our National Office. As the funding for this program no longer exists, we are looking for individuals, businesses, and sponsors to underwrite the costs to bring the Quilt to schools. We hope you will consider an annual donation of \$500 this year to help us continue to serve our schools.

us an E-mail for a WAD2001 Panel Request Form. There is a \$100 to \$200 honorarium per section to cover the costs of shipping, storing, printing, and handling the hundreds of emails, letters, and phone calls we receive for this event. The deadline to submit display requests is October 1, 2001.

Not all New York City panels automatically come for this event. Therefore, if you wish for your panel to be requested, you need to contact us by mail or email. Your request must include the panel 4-digit number and name on panel. As this will be the first time our National Office's new location will be open, we cannot guarantee all requests will be honored. The sooner we receive your request, the sooner we can submit it. Deadline for these special requests, in writing via mail or email is August 1, 2001.

Chapter Accomplishments

SCHOOLS COME TOGETHER IN QUEENS

During a week in March, Newcomers High School, in Long Island City, displayed a portion of the Quilt. The students had a number of goals they wanted to achieve. One of the outcomes were two beautiful panels that were submitted to the Chapter. From reading the comments and notes from the teacher and students, their words powerfully showed that the experience for the students was extraordinary, and the majority of students felt inspired to do something in response.

As teacher Julie Mann explained, "we decided that the best response would be to create our own panel for the Quilt. We share the building with another high school, and there have been conflicts between the schools. In an attempt to create something positive together, a group of students from each school designed our panels, together."

The collaboration was a huge success. Seven pages of pictures, comments, and emotional reactions were received from students along with the new panels. One student wrote, "when the student Council of Unity saw the Quilt and realized its value, we decided to show our tribute toward those who died of AIDS by building a panel to add to the Quilt. By creating these new Quilt panels, we tried to show people that youth, if given an opportunity, try to do our best to make a difference in the community." The panels that were received poignantly express that students have all the capabilities of expressing themselves.

We are honored to work with teachers and students who continue to bring the message of the Quilt to their student bodies.

PROSPECT PARK OUTDOOR DISPLAY

On Saturday, June 9, 2001, the Chapter displayed sixteen sections the Quilt in Prospect Park, Brooklyn. This was the third year the Quilt was part of Brooklyn Pride's day-long festival, celebration, and evening parade. This year's display location was new and away from the noises of the festival stage. It was also directly off the walking path for the thousands of 'Brooklynites' who use the park each day. We estimate that 3,000 visitors viewed the Quilt and hundreds of kids in strollers.

After many years of rainy or questionable weather, the day was sunny and perfect. With a large African-American population in the borough of Brooklyn, we decided to display not only portions of the United States Quilt, but include sections from South Africa. This beautiful additions to the display continue to assist the Chapter in our efforts to remind New Yorkers that HIV/AIDS is a global problem, and that it is not over. With more new HIV infections occurring in our black population, we use every opportunity to tie cultures and communities together. The presence of the Quilt from South Africa made a significant impact.

We were honored to have so many new volunteers to help this year, and look forward to seeing in the future. Our special thanks to Howard Orlick, Ernie Pedroso, Frank, Bernardo, Janice, Hank Krumholz, Jackie, James, Claire, Jo, chair Jeff Bosacki, and the many volunteers from Brooklyn Pride. We also want to thank the NYPD who assigned four uniformed officers to assist in security for the display. We thank everyone for making this year's display so successful.

SOUTH AFRICAN QUILT TOUR 2001-2003 IN AMERICA

The Chapter is working in collaboration with NAMES Project South Africa, and will be organizing a tour in the United States with portions of the South African Quilt thru November 2003. This fundraising effort is one of many ways the Chapter is supporting the work happening in South Africa. As NAMES Project South African didn't receive any funds from last year's tour, we wanted to change that and take the opportunity to raise awareness and funds for our colleagues. Since February, NAMES-NYC with the assistance of NAMES Project Philadelphia, NAMES Project NY Capital Region, and Bristol-Myers Squibb, the 2001 tour has already raised \$9,000 to assist with the South African School Quilt Program's office, staff, and volunteer expenses in for an entire year.

We are in the planing stages of also bringing two South Africans who will travel portions of the tour to bring their message of how HIV/AIDS has affected and infected their lives. We hope this will be a powerful message to bring to the states that HIV/AIDS is not only our global social responsibility, but remind Americans that HIV is still a serious problem here at home. With 50% of all new infection occurring in our African-American communities, the Chapter is committed to find new ways to bring our prevention message to all New Yorkers.

If you are interested in using a portion of the South African Quilt, please contact the Chapter for more information. There is an honorarium fee for each section, additional requirements to include speakers from South Africa, and shipping costs. This tour is specifically created to raise money to keep this program going for many years.

ANNUAL STREET FAIR AT NYU

On Saturday, July 28, 2001, we will be sponsoring our 9th Annual NYC Unfolds Street Fair on West 3rd Street stretching from LaGuardia Place to Broadway. The Chapter has invited colleagues from other HIV/AIDS organizations to provide information about services they offer New Yorkers. Over 200 food, merchandise and arts vendors will be there selling their food, crafts, and goods.

Eight sections of the Quilt will be on display, half will be sections from South Africa. We will have information about the Chapter's programs, volunteer opportunities, and NAMES Project merchandise provided by NAMES Project Northern New Jersey. Hours of the festival are from 11:00 am until 6:00 pm. We invite you to come, enjoy the day, and shop!

As the Long Island Chapter closed a couple of years ago, NAMES Project-NYC has been trying to keep alive the hard work started by the past chapter. Funds raised at this event will help us to continue bringing the Quilt to schools, businesses, and places of workshop in Long Island.

SOUTH AFRICA 2001 SCHOOL QUILT TOUR

We will be taking our second team of volunteers to South Africa this summer with the Chapter's "Quilt 101" School Program. From August 27 thru September 7th,

eight volunteers will travel to the Western Cape of South Africa to schools in poor townships outside Cape Town. Our goal is to reach more than 20,000 students, teachers, and parents, who see the affects of death and sickness every day in their community.

One of the components of our program is to introduce panelmaking to the students. We have encouraged each volunteer coming to South Africa, to bring "New Panel Kits" to give to schools we visit who are too poor to buy the materials to remember someone they have lost. From the panels made from last year's tour, it is clear that while the tradition of quilting is new to these communities, the ability to create a panel helps begin the grieving and healing process that they have not been able to do.

Panelmaking has shown it can help break the silence about talking about the disease, and helps change the attitudes. Each kit consists of a basic 3ft x 6ft section of material, felt or other materials for letters, borders, as well as pens, markers, paint and paint brushes to express their thoughts and memories.

Another component of the program is "sistering" or "partnering" schools we visit with schools here in New York and other cities in America. Each volunteer coming will bring one or more schools to begin sharing and assisting each other in their education and prevention efforts. If you are interested in either sistering with a school, businesses, or place of workshop, or helping us make kits, please contact the Chapter for more information.
